Cape student artist's works garner seven regional Scholastic Art honors

Had Noelle Webster followed the age-old wisdom of never making a split-second decision, a different letter might have arrived in her mailbox last month. But acting on a hunch she got while in a rush last summer, Webster, 16, a Cape Elizabeth High School junior, took out her camera and snapped a shot that has not only won a Maine Scholastic Art Gold Key award but also is nominated for a national Scholastic Art American Vision Award.

Five other works by Webster also received honors in the regional contest: two Silver Key awards and three honorable mentions.

"Stars, Stripes and Shadows," the photo that won top honors, will move onto New York City in the spring for national judging.

So spur of the moment was the shot that Webster forgot she had taken it. A week after snapping it, she discovered what she had when she checked her camera. At the time,

Webster was in the middle of a five-week precollege program at the School of the Museum of Fine Arts in Boston.

"On July 3, when I was rushing to catch the T from the North End back to school, I saw this American flag draped in front of a fenced-in rose garden," she said. "It was perfect timing, around dinnertime, so the contrast was kind of bumped up because of the position of the sun. I wasn't expecting that image to come from that scenario. Sometimes that just happens."

Webster took her Silver-Key-winning photograph, "Red," closer to home—near the intersection of Shore Road and Olde Colony Lane, where she lives. Ironically, Webster was on her way home from taking pictures across the street at the beach when she got her best picture of the day.

"I was actually across the way at Pond Cove

A snowy tunnel, but there's light at the end of it

"There is a light at the end of the tunnel," says Cape Elizabeth Public Works Director Bob Malley, when asked about the rising banks of snow along Cape roads.

The Public Works Department is responsible for clearing all 62 miles of Cape Elizabeth public roads of snow in the winter. As of Malley's Jan. 28 interview with *The Cape Courier*, those 62 miles had already been covered with 43 inches of snow [10 to 12 additional inches fell during the storms of Feb. 2 and 3 as this newspaper was about to go to print]. "And we basically have two more months of winter."

The average annual snowfall in Cape

Elizabeth is about 70 inches, according to Malley. "We had a busy January, and we are a little bit ahead ... Yes, we've been chewing up diesel fuel. Yes, we've been chewing up overtime ... but we could have a quiet February."

"We don't have a snow budget," says Malley. "But obviously, most of our overtime is in the wintertime."

Malley commends Public Works Department personnel "who have done a great job this winter ... working together to make our community look as good as it does. Whether they drive a loader, a truck, a sidewalk machine, or make repairs to all three, they take

Stepping into the Sesquicentennial

About 150 years ago, on the eve of the Civil War, the people of Cape Elizabeth were going about their daily business, unaware of the trials to come. Certainly there were signs of trouble brewing, but except for the recent election, it all must have seemed very far away. In coming months, *The Cape Courier* will run a series that follows the development of the war through the eyes of people who lived in Cape Elizabeth in 1861. Cape Elizabeth author Paul J. Ledman's book, "A Maine Town Responds," will be the major guide. The series opens with background information about the town in 1860 and follows political currents that must have been major topics in town. In succeeding months, small entries in this newspaper will capture the news and concerns as events unfolding outside of Cape Elizabeth thrust their way into the local conscience.

One hundred and fifty years ago, Cape Elizabeth was a very different place. Much larger in area, the town then included what is now South Portland, yet with a total population of only 3,273 people. About a third of Cape families, 246, were farmers; about 160 worked in the maritime trades as fishermen and mariners. Shipbuilding was big along the Fore River facing Port-

land. Other significant businesses in town included Portland Kerosene and Oil Company and Great Pond Mining and Agriculture Company. A railway, with a Cape depot, crossed the western side of town near current-day Cash Corner.

Almost half of town residents "had an average personal wealth of less than \$50,"

Tri-town workshop in Cape Elizabeth on Feb. 17 to consider electricity purchase

The Town Council will host a joint workshop with Scarborough and South Portland on Thursday, Feb. 17 to discuss the possibility of wholesale purchase and resale of electricity in the three towns.

The workshop will begin at 7 p.m. in the Town Hall chamber and will include a presentation led by South Portland Assistant Manager Erik Carson on the evaluation effort.

"The city of South Portland and the town of Scarborough have been exploring for several months the opportunity to purchase electricity wholesale for resale to residential and small commercial customers," said Cape Elizabeth Town Manager Mike McGovern. "The goal is to reduce the cost of the power

supply below the standard offer that is the default rate for power in Maine. Cape Elizabeth was recently asked by our neighbors to consider joining them in evaluating the advantages and risks of such a program."

Town Councilor Jim Walsh said that Cape Elizabeth, like South Portland and Scarborough, was also approached individually by a company marketing the opportunity.

Under the contemplated plan, power customers would need to sign on for a set period, likely either 6 or 12 months, and agree to utilize the power entity for their supply, according to McGovern.

Customers would continue to be billed for the electricity by Central Maine Power.

Do you have unclaimed property?

Do you have money coming to you? The State of Maine may be holding unclaimed property that belongs to you. Millions of dollars are turned over annually to the State of Maine by entities which cannot locate the owners.

Unclaimed property consists of money and other personal assets that are considered lost or abandoned when an owner cannot be located after a specified period of time. It includes checking accounts, certificates of deposit, over payments, gift certificates, paid-up life insurance policies, unpaid wages, commissions, uncashed checks, death benefits, dividends, insurance payments, money orders, refunds, savings accounts, stocks and contents of safe deposit boxes. Unclaimed

property does not include real estate, animals or vehicles.

Since July 2009 there have been 16,598 claims totaling \$11.8 million. On average, claim amounts were \$712, according to the state treasurer.

There is no fee to process an unclaimed property claim. Citizens may check the unclaimed property list on the web site of the Maine State Treasurer at: https://www.maine.gov/treasurer/unclaimed_property/online/ and can download claim forms to mail in or file a claim electronically.







Planning Board names Elaine Falender chair

Elaine Falender was elected Planning Board Chair at a special meeting of the Planning Board held Feb. 1. Jim Huebener was named vice chair.

Carol Anne Jordan was named the Planning Board representative member of the Future Open Space Preservation Committee.

The next regular meeting of the Planning Board will be March 17.

The Feb. 15 meeting, like the Jan. 18

meeting, has been canceled, as no projects have been submitted for review.

At the March 17 meeting, the board will reconsider a recommendation to limit roosters to properties of at least 40,000 square feet. The recommendation had been tabled after a Dec. 21 public hearing and was also discussed at a Jan. 4 workshop.

Town Planner Maureen O'Meara said she also anticipated that several projects to be submitted for review would be considered at the March meeting.

Town-owned rental space at 343 Ocean House Road

The Town Council on Jan. 10 approved an extended lease with the Edward D. Jones investment firm for office space at 343 Ocean House Road, in front of the Cape Elizabeth Community Center.

The lease extends the current agreement, set to expire Feb. 29, 2012, five years to Feb. 28, 2017. Rent for the next 14 months of the lease would decrease from \$1,492.85 to \$1,250 per month. Beginning March 1, 2012, rent will increase 3 percent annually, stopping at \$1,449.09 per month beginning March 1, 2016.

While the agreement decreases the monthly rent for the 1,000 square-foot-space over the long term, officials agreed to trade the \$20,900 expected from the remaining 14 months of the lease for the guarantee of \$99,524 over the next six years.

"My recommendation is, it's great to have a national lease holder because you know in the end they are going to pay the money," McGovern said. The

firm has said they are looking to consolidate office holdings but would like to keep the Cape Elizabeth location they have occupied since 2002. "However, recognizing the market, recognizing they are willing to sign a longer-term contract, they'd like the lease amount to go down," McGovern said.

The Edward Jones lease is the most recent to be finalized for the three rental properties that are part of the Community Center property located in the Town Center. In December, the council approved a one-year lease with GMJHW LLC, (Michael Moore) for 160 square feet at \$250 a month. In October, they approved a lease with attorney Jamie Wagner for the same size space and same rent. The Wagner lease may be renewed for two years at \$275 a month.

Revenue from leases go to the Community Services Revenue Fund.

Cape resident B2B registration is March 14; organizers add 250 slots to lottery

Cape Elizabeth residents may register for this year's Beach to Beacon road race on March 14, the day before registration opens up to the general public.

This year's race is scheduled for Saturday, Aug. 6.

A lottery with an expanded 1,750 slots – up from 1,500 last year – will then take place from March 15 to March 22.

Here is the registration schedule:

Monday, March 14, 2011 at 7 a.m.: on-line registration opens for Cape Elizabeth residents only, on a first-come, first-served basis. Registration on March 14 will be limited to 600.

Tuesday, March 15, 2011 at 7 a.m.: online registration opens to the general public on a first-come, first-served basis. Registration will be limited to 4,000.

The remaining 1,750 spots will be distributed by lottery. Provisions for couples and families will be made in the lottery process. Registration for the lottery will be held from March 15 to March 22. The lottery drawing will be held on March 23. The race will charge a \$5 fee to enter the lottery.

The race will allow transfers from May 1 through June 30. The race will charge a \$5 transfer fee. Cape Elizabeth residents registered in the 600 entries allocated to Cape Elizabeth residents can only transfer to another Cape Elizabeth resident.

"We made a significant change in the registration process last year and feel overall it went well, so we are staying the course," said volunteer Race President David Weatherbie. "Also, we are pleased to be able to expand the number of lottery slots this year to accommodate more runners."

Last year's Cape resident registration filled in 21 minutes, while online registration for the general public was open just 32 minutes before all slots were filled. Runners will continue to register at the race web site, www.beach2beacon.org.

New for 2011, registered runners will receive complimentary technical, or "tech," running shirts. The tech T-shirts, popular with runners for their moisture-wicking capability, will replace the traditional cotton T-shirts.

Also, to cover the cost of a new \$25,000 Fort Williams Park fee from the town of Cape Elizabeth, the registration fee has increased to \$40 per participant, \$5 more than in 2010.

After Cape resident, general public and lottery slots have been assigned, the remaining bibs will be set aside for runners who have participated in every TD Bank Beach to Beacon – known as "streakers" – as well as sponsors, elite athletes and charities.

Race organizers will accept approximately 7,200 registrations this year, again

targeting a race-day field of 6,000. A record 5,672 runners finished the race last year. The race has more than doubled in size since it debuted in 1998 with 2,408 runners crossing the finish line.

The TD Bank Beach to Beacon is one of Maine's premiere sporting events and one of the most popular events on the U.S. road-race circuit. The race draws runners from throughout the region and the world to the picturesque coastal community of Cape Elizabeth. Thousands of spectators cheer on the runners along the scenic course and at the finish, and more than 800 volunteers help ensure a smooth operation.

The race begins near the Crescent Beach entrance on Route 77 in Cape Elizabeth, winds past breathtaking ocean vistas, and ends in Fort Williams Park at the historic Portland Head Light, the most photographed lighthouse in the world.

More than \$60,000 in prize money is awarded to the top finishers and place winners in the various categories for men and women.

TD Bank is the title sponsor of the race founded by Joan Benoit Samuelson, the 1984 Olympic gold medalist from Cape Elizabeth. The race is directed by Dave McGillivray of DMSE Sports, who also directs the B.A.A. Boston Marathon.

Ledman's book states. One man, John Goddard, a lumberman, stood out as the richest person in town, with \$200,000 in real estate and an equal amount of personal property. His personal property "was virtually half of that of all the citizens in town combined," Ledman writes in his book.

The farmers, mariners, fishermen, ship-builders, carpenters, masons, coopers, and railway engineers of the town centered their daily lives on personal matters and local concerns, especially about schools and bridges, yet they were aware of distant political rumblings.

Some citizens were old enough to remember the Constitutional Convention. Many had watched the political birth of the Missouri Compromise, an attempt to put the slavery issue to rest. Through this 1820 compromise, Maine entered the Union as a free state and Missouri as a slave state. All were aware that the issue of slavery refused to go away and that it had been a critical factor in the recent presidential election.

Election of 1860

The election of 1860 had been a doozy. The Democratic Party split in two over how to deal with the issue of slavery. Northern Democrats put forth one candidate, Stephen A. Douglas, and Southern Democrats nominated John Breckinridge. The Republicans, on a third ballot, had elected Abraham Lincoln, with Hannibal Hamlin of Maine as his vice president, while the Constitutional Union Party chose John Bell.

"In November 1860 Lincoln swept the north with over 60 percent of its vote," and Cape Elizabeth gave Lincoln 62.2 percent of its vote. Nationally, Lincoln had 39.8 percent, and in Cumberland County he had 59 percent, Ledman writes in "A Maine Town Responds."


The telegraph had come to Portland in the 1850s, so news traveled quickly, and locals soon learned that on Dec. 20, 1860, just after Lincoln's election, South Carolina seceded, followed shortly by Mississippi, Florida, Alabama, Georgia, Louisiana and Texas.

"South Carolina took that fateful step because it believed that, in spite of its stated policy, a Republican administration would move to destroy slavery by tactics such as appointing antislavery judges, military officers and other federal officials in the South, Ledman's book states.

Maj. Robert Anderson

But soon the news became more personal. A certain Maj. Robert Anderson, who had served at Fort Preble and was well known to many locals, was in charge of the federal garrison in Charleston, S.C. On Dec.

26, 1860, he moved "his force of 76 enlisted men, about 10 officers and a small number of laborers to Fort Sumter" from the mainland where the Federal garrison was surrounded by South Carolina troops. Anderson believed it to be indefensible. On Jan. 9, President Buchanan tried to get supplies to the fort, but gunfire kept the ship out of

Responds."

Future installments will present, step by step, Cape Elizabeth's experiences of 150 years ago. Information will come from various sources, including Ledman's book, but news will be presented as current news bulletins that Cape Elizabethans of 1861 might have read.

Cape college students give European biking culture, infrastructure high grades

McKayla Dunfey and Erin Hatton, members of Cape Elizabeth High School's Class of 2008, may have taken off their fall semesters from college, but the two got quite an education in the cycling cultures and cycling infrastructures of European cities. Dunfey, a junior majoring in environmental studies at Hamilton College in Clinton, N.Y., and Hatton, a Bowdoin College junior majoring in biochemistry, took an 11-week bike tour through Europe with another Bowdoin junior, Amie Corso.

"I've become concerned about America's carbon footprint since becoming an environmental studies major ... and I see the development of a more vigorous cycling culture in the United States as part of the solution," Dunfey wrote in an account of the trip.

Three European cities won rave reviews from the three women.

"In Amsterdam, I was amazed by the guarded parking lots completely full of bikes, wide 'fietspads' (bike lanes) on every street, bike traffic lights at every intersection, bike shops on every block, and permanent bike racks built into the side of apartments," Dunfey wrote.

Paris, with the largest bike-share program in the world, was "truly impressive with 20,600 bicycles and 1,451 stations throughout the city," she stated.

El Bicing, Barcelona's bicycle-share program, has made the city a "thriving, bike-navigable city with over 128 kilometers of bicycle lanes and paths, 6,000 bicycles, and 400 stations located roughly every 300 meters

along the major roads of the city."

U.S. cities such as Washington, D.C., Denver and Minneapolis have established bike-share programs, and Boston and New York City are in the process of developing their own, said Dunfey, who believes that other U.S. cities should follow suit.

"We should pay close attention, especially during this critical time when many Americans are realizing the effects of our large carbon footprints and seeking out alternatives to our gas-guzzling SUVs," she wrote.

Riding a bicycle has many advantages, not the least of which is pleasure, Dunfey said.

"Biking solves traffic problems, is good for your health, and reduces our carbon footprint, but I can also say from plenty of personal experience that biking brings joy. After cycling nearly 3,000 kilometers through five countries, I still feel the joy of a simple bike ride through Cape Elizabeth as much as I did before I left, but I've come home with a new appreciation for what is possible for cycling in the United States, and I hope to be part of the movement that turns these possibilities into reality."



Fiber artist Nancy Hill exhibits in February

The Thomas Memorial Library is presenting a fiber art exhibit, featuring works by Nancy Hill of Cundy's Harbor, throughout the month of February. The exhibited work, all in fabric, depicts familiar local and iconic scenes in a "painterly manner."

After more than twenty-five years of designing and making bed quilts for family members and clients, Hill turned to fiber painting "as her next challenge in artistic expression." While employing many techniques used in quilting, fiber art permits unrestricted experimentation with additional media, according to Hill.

"The primary focus in each picture is the texture and color suggested by the fabric itself and the suitability of its design to the subject," says Hill.

"Shapes are cut and fused or appliquéd onto a fabric background. The work is quilt-

ed by machine or by hand to add additional texture and shading and to secure the work to its background. It is then embellished, a step that can utilize the full range of art products available, including pencil, ink, dye, bleach, paint, thread painting and embroidery. The framing finishes the work as a picture, rather than a quilt."

Sales of exhibited artwork 'very strong'

"Sales of works exhibited recently by gallery artists have been very strong, which benefits the town budget as well as the artists," reports Julia Bassett Schwerin of the Cape Elizabeth Arts Commission. The Arts Commission manages the gallery at the Thomas Memorial Library.

"We are looking forward to a year of ex-

hibits planned with high production value, innovative and transportive works by artists from all over New England."

In March, the library will host an exhibit of low-level aerial photographs by Scarborough resident James Shields. Look for more about this upcoming exhibit in the next edition of *The Cape Courier*.

tremendous pride in what they do.”

Typically, plowing begins after an accumulation of two to three inches of snow, although Malley says that may vary somewhat with, for instance, an earlier start to commuter traffic and school buses. After each storm, the main roads are treated with clear salt. Secondary roads are treated with a sand/salt mixture.

It is fortunate that most of the plowing this winter has been done during work-week days. “Weekend storms are time and a half,”

says Malley.

“There are huge snow banks for this time of year,” Malley says. “We are running out of places to put the snow. The places where we usually deposit snow: the municipal and school parking lots, cul-de-sacs, dead ends and the edges of roads [are getting full]. We are having to haul the snow.”

Snow is hauled to one of two “snow dumps” at Public Works and at Fort Williams Park, near the maintenance building. These dumps have been created with an ero-

sion control mixture of shredded wood to form an outside perimeter. This outer perimeter will filter water from the mix of snow, dirt, salt and sand as it eventually melts.

“The challenge now is that people’s patience is getting a little thin with the shoveling.” Malley also acknowledged the challenge of diminishing sightlines and narrowing of some of the town’s older roads, which are narrow to begin with, without growing mounds of snow.

“Private plowers plowing snow across roads [and leaving a mess] is a problem.”

Moving snow onto town roads is both a violation of a town ordinance and a hazard, according to Malley.

Town ordinance also bans overnight on-road parking between the hours of 1 a.m. and 5 a.m. until April 1 to accommodate plowing.

So where is the light at the end of the tunnel?

“By the middle of February the days get longer and the angle of the sun changes so that you get more melting. Salt works better and we can put less sand down.”

“We’re not out of the woods in March,” Malley adds. “The snow just doesn’t stay around as long.”

McGovern emphasized that none of the three communities have committed to moving forward at this date. “We are pursuing every opportunity that exists to reduce costs ... or generate income in some fashion,” said

Councilor Walsh. “There may be some opportunity here, and if so we should give it our time and consideration.”

McGovern provided the following statistics: “Cape Elizabeth has 3,940 residential, 212 commercial, 2 industrial and 11 street-

light electricity accounts. In 2008, the accounts used a combined 41,796,249 Kwh. The average Cape Elizabeth residential account uses 710 Kwh a month. The average Maine home uses 521 Kwh per month, which is the lowest average for any state. Maine

uses less power due to less summer cooling and our reliance on oil heat. The average statewide monthly residential electricity bill in Maine in 2009 was \$81.60.”

The workshop is open to the public and will also be televised on CETV.

shooting images of waves, because it was one of the big swell days, and after I was done at Pond Cove, I saw the berries in the swampy area right across the street from my house, and I thought it might be worth a shot.”

Three works that Webster created in an advanced studio art class at CEHS also won honors. A charcoal figure study received a Silver Key, and a continuous line drawing and a continuous wire rendering got honorable mentions.

Another photograph, “Fireworks,” which Webster took during the Independence Day firework display in Boston the day after she took “Stars, Stripes and Shadows,” also received an honorable mention.

Webster will attend a reception for regional Scholastic Art Award winners at noon on Saturday, March 19, at Heartwood College of Art, 125 York Street in Kennebunk.

The Scholastic Art competition is the longest running student recognition program for the visual arts in the United States. Since the late 1920s when the competition was established, some winners have gone on to become nationally renowned artists — Richard Avedon, Robert Indiana, and Andy Warhol among them.

A swimmer for both Cape Elizabeth High School and Coastal Maine Aquatics swim club, Webster would like to pursue a career in commercial design and advertising, “the artistic side of it,” she said. “I would like to keep up my painting and photography but keep those as more of a side passion.”
