Any recent visitor to the Swap Shop at the Cape Elizabeth Recycling Center will bemoan the fact that a town treasure is turning to trash.

Toys, puzzles, games – all piled high – the pieces spilled and thrown asunder, making them worthless. Bric-a-brac and household items beyond their last legs are placed there instead of either being tossed out or possibly recycled.

It may be that we are a victim of our own success. We all have a tale of scoring a great find, and have been conditioned that the hopper is the last place we want an item to go. Instead of trashing, we think, "Oh, maybe someone can use this for something" and we add it to a growing pile of what can, unfortunately, only be considered trash.

What can we do?

Implementing a few simple suggestions will begin to restore our space from trash to treasure. If bringing multiple items from home in a shopping bag, please remove the items from the bag and place them

on the appropriate table or shelf instead of placing the bag on the floor or table.

Then recycle the bag – there is a big "recycle barrel" in the corner by the last row of books. This way, the items in your bag won't be tossed about and wind up on the floor. And, if each of us placed one misplaced item in its correct location during our visit, we would begin to restore order.

If a stuffed animal is showing signs of wear, ask yourself: "Would this be something I would bring to my child or grandchild?" And if the answer is no, then please place it in the hopper and not the Swap Shop.

Household items with parts – cords, tops, lids, etc. – also should be packaged to preserve the usefulness of the item. Taping down a cord or lid will truly help. If any item is not in working order, or parts are missing, the destination is either the hopper, or a silver bullet if it is made of a recyclable material.

Jigsaw puzzles, board games, plastic larger toys or any unboxed toy with parts should be packaged in a way that the integrity of the item remains for others to actually take home and enjoy. Place game pieces in ziploc bags inside the box and then place rubber bands around the outer box. Toys without boxes should have pieces taped to retain usefulness.

Browsing at the Swap Shop is limited to residents and in fairness to all, to 15 min-

utes a day, one visit per day.

Children should be supervised and everyone should be encouraged to be respectful of the items and the rules for donating.

The Recycling Center has a limited staff to manage what is a myriad of daily responsibilities and its volunteer members cannot be expected to supervise behavior of the public. However, people who blatantly abuse and violate the rules, such as overextending their stay or placing items such as tires and TVs (which require a fee) may be prohibited from using the Swap Shop.

Let's rescue our gem by using common sense, taking some preventative measures, and exercising personal responsibility to return the Swap Shop to a place we can once again call a treasure.



Spurwink Trail: A quiet retreat with a rewarding view

This is part of a continuing series of articles on the town's greenbelt system of open space and trails. These trails are construct-

ed and maintained by the Cape Elizabeth Conservation Commission, an all-volunteer seven-member board that reports to the



Town Council and is dedicated to the preservation and the promotion of access to the public open spaces in town.

The commission meets on the second Tuesday of each month at Town Hall, and the public is always welcome.

The town owns more than 1,000 acres of open space. Much of this land is accessible to the public via 15-plus miles of greenbelt trails. Look for greenbelt signs (above) at all trailheads and also throughout the trail system to help you navigate your way on and through the trails.


Spurwink Trail

Most people flock to the ocean during our beautiful Maine summer. But if you're looking for a quieter retreat, the approximately one-mile Spurwink Trail may be for you.

The trail skirts the edge of the Spurwink Marsh and the fields of the town farm. It is a loop that begins and ends at different locations along Spurwink Avenue. The three main access points are just south of the branch of the Spurwink River (across from the sewer treatment plant), at the cluster of trees extending from Spurwink Avenue across the fields, and on the north side of

The trail generally follows the edge of the mowed field, but at its southern end, it slips into the woods and runs along the edge of the marsh. The reward for following this low-lying section is the view of the marsh as the trail rises to a lightly wooded point nestled between the marsh and the northern side of Pollack Creek. From that point, the path meanders along the creek back to Spurwink Avenue, just before the guardrail. Trail users should be respectful as as they pass along several colonial gravesites.

The trail surface is grassy in the field, but once you enter the woods can be muddy with exposed roots.

Draft of Greenbelt Plan almost done

The town Conservation Commission is working to complete the draft Greenbelt Plan so that it can be sent to the Town Council. Committee members have discussed the public comment received and will continue their review of the document and potential trail links.

Conservation Commission meetings are held the second Tuesday of the month in Town Hall.

Two Lights Trail

Many of the public comments express concern with how the trails may expand. The most recent draft includes case studies of how trails have been expanded since the 2001 Greenbelt Plan was adopted.

The second case study features the Two Lights Trail, which extends from Two Lights Road, across from the strawberry field, east to the Broad Cove trails.

The 1980s Spinnaker Heights Subdivision included a 15-foot-wide pedestrian easement extending from Two Lights Road, ending at land occupied by St. Bartholomew's Church.

The back corner includes a picturesque pond. The Roman Catholic Diocese granted the town a five-year easement around the pond that connected the Spinnaker Heights easement to Highlands Subdivision open space.

When the 2001 was adopted, the St. Bart's easement was one of five priorities because it would expire if a trail was not constructed within five years. An abutter, who operates a preschool in her home, objected to the trail connection. Objections made at the time included:

- · Loss of privacy
- Parents concerned with safety of
- People already use another trail nearby
- No way to create a buffer
- Questioning the sincerity of the Conservation Commission to minimize the impact of the trails on homeowners
- · Easements not easily obtained; do not let the easement lapse

In 2013, a trail boardwalk was reconstructed in a partnership with the Boy Scouts. The new comment from the preschool was, "We are so lucky to have them [trails] right behind our school to enjoy every day.'

The Conservation Commission is continuing to accept emails and letters and also allows 15 minutes of public comment at the beginning of each meeting. Once complete, the draft Greenbelt Plan will be forwarded to the Town Council for consideration.

Tri for Preservation on Aug. 18 at Crescent Beach benefits CELT

The 2013 Tri for Preservation, sponsered by Noyes, Hall & Allen Insurance, is set for 7:30 a.m. Sunday, Aug. 18 at Crescent Beach State Park.

Now in its third year, the Tri for Preservation features sprint distance triathlon, aquabike and duathlon competitions as well as a team-relay triathlon competition.

Executive Director Chris Franklin says the July Paint for Preservation event and the Tri for Preservation are designed to bring attention to the Cape Elizabeth Land Trust's land conservation work and to raise funds for its nonprofit conservation mission."

In each of the last two years, the Tri for Preservation attracted more than 300 participants and twice as many spectators and volunteers. This triathlon consists of a 500-yard ocean swim along the well protected cove of Crescent Beach.

Participants then transition to a 14.5-mile, rolling bike course past scenic farmlands, woodlands and marshlands. The course concludes with a 3.1-mile run along the shore of Crescent Beach toward Kettle Cove and back along Route 77.

The Tri for Preservation Aquabike is ideal

for those who want to compete but do not run. The aquabike features the same swim and bike course as the triathlon, but the aquabike concludes upon return to the transition area after the bike leg of the race.

The Tri for Preservation Duathlon is designed for nonswimmers and features a 1.5mile run followed by the same 14.5 mile bike and a 3.1 mile finishing run.

Swimmers, runners and bikers who do not do triathlons also have the option to form a team to compete with friends and family.


Pancake Breakfast

They are currently held by Councilors Frank Governali and Caitlin Jordan and School Board members Michael Moore and Mary Townsend.



In January, the library launched its subscription to OneClickdigital, a service from Recorded Books that offers thousands of audiobooks that can be downloaded directly to computers and mobile devices.

The titles initially available to Thomas Memorial Library patrons were mostly adult fiction and nonfiction. As of last month, a partnership with the Cape Elizabeth School Department has made it possible for the library to provide a full library of audiobook titles for children and teens.

All you need to download any of the titles for adults, children, or teens is a valid Thomas Memorial Library card.

The titles included in the subscription are compatible with Apple devices such as iPods and iPhones, as well as other MP3 devices

All of the books in OneClick-digital are available for immediate download, with a self-determined checkout period of up to three weeks and are renewable after the initial loan period has expired.

To access this service, visit the Thomas Memorial Library's website and click on the OneClickdigital icon.

First-time users will need to use their library card to set up a free account.







Stepping into the Sesquicentennial

A Cape Courier series by Cape Elizabeth resident Ellen Van Fleet follows the Civil War through the eyes of people who lived in Cape Elizabeth 150 years ago, when the Civil War was in its third year. Using Portland author Paul Ledman's book, "A Maine Town Responds," as the main guide, the series includes both short entries from the Portland Transcript, a newspaper, and letters from a local soldier who served on the western front. Items from the Portland Transcript and from soldiers' letters are reported verbatim.

Aug. 15, 1863: A train of six covered wagons filled with Gypsies entered Ellsworth last week, and in half an hour the females were visiting the stores and offices seeking out such persons as wanted their fortunes told. [Portland Transcript]

Mrs. Lincoln and her two sons are at the White Mountains. The President is not going to join them as has been reported. [Portland Transcript]

A 15-inch Rodman gun for Fort Scammel, which arrived here last week, has attracted much attention on Railway Wharf. It is one of the "dogs of war" that looks as if it might have a very loud bark. It weighs 25 tons, throws a ball weighing 460 pounds, and requires 50 pounds of powder for a charge. [Portland Transcript]

A living infant was found among the dirt in Prospect Street, on Friday week. This is the second abandoned infant which has been found within three weeks. Both are at the Alms House in want of mothers. [Portland Transcript]

August 22, 1863: Saco Pool, Old Orchard Beach, and other watering places on this coast are this season unusually thronged with visitors. In this vicinity, on the islands and at the Cape, all the hotels and boarding houses are crowded. [Portland Transcript]

New music: We have received the following popular songs from the publishers, O. Ditson & Co., Boston: "We'll fight for Uncle Abe" and "Wanted – a Substitute." [Portland Transcript]

There were over 900 deaths in the city of New York in the first week of August. A large number were caused by the intense heat. [Portland Transcript]

The Portland Steam Packet Company declined to receive any remuneration for use of the steamer Forest City which they sent so promptly to assist in the recapture of the Caleb Cushing. The government expected to pay for the service so nobly rendered, but ... this is declined. [Portland Transcript]

Gardiner F. Hanson, rigger, of this city, was seriously injured by a fall from the ship Ocean Favorite, on the marine railway at the Cape, last Friday. His face was badly bruised and his skull fractured, but it is thought he will recover. [Portland Transcript]

Foreign – Some of the leading English papers, always favorable to the rebels, are giving up the cause of the South as virtually lost. A great change is going on in public opinion, and it is even said that the British government will now take active measures to prevent the fitting out of privateers in their harbors. [Port*land Transcript*]

August 29, 1863: Look out for clumsy alterations of one dollar bills on the State bank, Augusta. Some of them have made their appearance changed to fives. [Portland Transcript]

An 1863 fall election showed "anti-war, anti-Lincoln sentiment was strong among Cape Democrats in 1863" with a Republican governorial candidate garnering only 50.4 percent of the vote in town. Anti-war sentiment would "gain even more strength as more calls for men were issued."

Editor's note: Cape Elizabeth resident Scott Dyer Jordan left his wife Judith and their three children in 1863 to serve as a naval ensign in the Civil War. From 1847 to 1853 he was a mariner, plying trade routes in New England, England, the West Indies, the Caribbean and the southern coast of the United States. While at sea he sent many letters home describing his voyages. After the war, he settled down to farming and served for a while as the superintendent of Cape Elizabeth Poor Farm. He wrote the following letter aboard the ironclad ship, the Carondelet.

U.S. Steamer Carondelet Aug 11, 1863 Dear Wife,

[After explaining that the furlough he hoped to get was unlikely as he had not yet served a full year, Jordan wrote]:

... However I shall do my best to get home sooner on your account. ... When one stops to consider the circumstances in our case I don't know that we ought to find any fault even if we are separated for a year. We enjoyed 11 years of happiness together which was as perfect as ever was the lot of mortals to enjoy. And even this separation is with the idea of our future happiness. It is necessary to gain some of this world's goods in order to be prepared to live. And it is a pleasure for me to do it. I am willing to deprive myself of the

pleasures of the society of my family for a time if by doing I can derive a permanent benefit. I am one of a great many thousands that are away from their homes & families and I suppose all of them look forward with pleasure to the time when they will meet them again as I do, yet willing to serve their country and to obey their superiors in everything which tends to restore our Glorious Free institutions and free the slaves. Nothing short of this will full sat-

I am Patriot enough to do this without considering it a task either. Though some things of course are unpleasant I think you will agree with me in my thinking I owe my country a duty at this time and it is a pleasure to serve in so good a cause. I think you will not allow yourself to be despondent & gloomy in regard to it. But quite the reverse. I know your principles in regard to the country are as loyal as mine. And for that reason l think you will put up without complaint what others might not. And I have faith to believe that you, when you consider all circumstances fully, will be as willing to have me serve as I am willing to serve. We have the privilege of writing to each other and of hearing of each other often. I prize this privilege beyond value for were it not for receiving letters from you I know I could not content myself away from home 30 days.

Now that you may be contented and happy is the constant wish of your Affectionate husband Scott. D. Jordan

MSPA's mum sale to begin on Sept. 3






