Cape boys' and girls' ultimate frisbee teams take first place at PVI

Both the Cape Elizabeth boys' and girls' ultimate frisbee teams took first place at the Pioneer Valley Invitational tournament in Northampton, Massachusetts.

The PVI is one of the largest school tournaments in the country, with teams from New Jersey to Canada travelling to compete in the two-day tournament.

Tim Hebda is one of the coaches for the girls' team, and he said that the PVI in Massachusetts is a high-level tournament and provides Maine teams, with athletes from places like Cape Elizabeth, Falmouth, Portland, Waynflete and Cumberland, a chance to see other teams and compete at a more rigorous level.

Both the boys' and girls' teams played six games over the two-day tournament. "Each game is 90 minutes and the athletes need to be in terrific shape," Hebda said.

On their way to taking first place, the Cape girls had a final game facing off against Green Mountain of Vermont. "The championship came down to Universe Point, the next to score wins. Cape had been down by three with a strong breeze impacting gameplay. The girls not only closed the gap, but won the championship on the last point," Hebda said. See photos of the teams on right.

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News from May 16 PB meeting

April 18, 2023 Meeting Minutes Approval

The Planning Board asked for approval of the April 18, meeting minutes. The motion was introduced by Jim Huebener and seconded by Derek LaVallee. With no discussion from the board, the motion passed unanimously. Meeting minutes from the May 2 Planning Board Workshop were also approved.

Solar Array Cape Elizabeth Landfill

ER Cape Elizabeth Solar, LLC, is requesting a site plan amendment to install a 0.9 MW solar array at the Cape Elizabeth Landfill located at 21 Dennison Dr (R05-10), Sec. 19-9, Site Plan Public Hearing.

Jim Reid of Sevee & Maher Engineers, representing ER Cape Elizabeth Solar, LLC, gave the board a summary of the proposed project which included that ER Cape Solar, LLC, proposes to install a .9 megawatt AC solar array on a 6.5-acre leased portion of a 188-acre parcel located at 21 Dennison Drive at the Cape Elizabeth landfill location.

The proposed 6.5-acre leased parcel is marked on town documents as "lot 10, map 5" and in residential zone A. Its use will be essential services/utilities/public service and it meets all zoning ordinances, including setbacks and height requirements.

The solar array consists of 2796 modules, a 7-foot high perimeter fence, ballast foundations, and concrete equipment pads. There will be no penetration to the existing landfill cap and an estimated 10,000 square feet of earth will be disturbed, mostly for the ballast foundations.

Reid presented the board with two amendments. The first being to move the perimeter fence from the bottom of the hill as proposed to installing it more closely around the solar array. Secondly, sound tests were performed around different areas of the proposed site including at the transfer pad. No sound disturbance issues were found on the proposed site.

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Focus on facts, not attacks

It's hard to escape the increased rancor of the last couple of years. It's also noticeable that we've seen more reliance on misleading assertions, innuendo, personal attacks on the character of our town staff and larger sums of dark money entering local politics.

We can debate ideas without attacking people. We can use facts to create cohesive and comprehensive solutions. This isn't a bipartisan issue — it's a nonpartisan issue.

It affects all of us, whether you're young in years or young in heart, whether you've lived here a day or generations. It's on all of us to be the community we want to model for our children and grandchildren.

Thoughts on housing issue

As deadlines approach around the housing issue in Cape Elizabeth, one thing has become perfectly clear; there are two concurrent processes at play.

The first process is happening in response to the new state law, LD 2003. Working with Cape's town planner, members of the Ordinance Committee have explained that the scope of their work is focused on what must be done to comply with the law. In short, the Ordinance Committee's proposed amendments are not to include changes that "would be nice." Their changes, as they've explained, are about what is required by LD 2003.

So, who is looking at the second process, in regard to "what would be nice?" This is the work being done by the Housing Diversity Study Committee (HDSC). For example, Cape already complies with the Accessory Dwelling Unit (ADU) size requirements. Might it be nice to allow for significantly larger ADU's? Might it be nice to give property owners more flexibility on what they want to build on their property, including small apartments? Might it be nice to open up town-owned land including our parks and little league fields to housing development? Or, might our community have valid concerns with these types of changes?

The pressing concern today revolves around the Ordinance Committee's currently proposed amendments. Is their proposal in fact limited to the changes that are required by LD 2003? Or does it include changes they believe "would be nice?"

Then and Now: Coming to you from poolside



This 1936 photo shows the outdoor swimming pool built in 1935 at Fort Williams. The pool was buried in the 1970s.

Relatively few Cape Elizabethans today will recall the outdoor swimming pool at Fort Williams. The pool was situated roughly at the eastern end of today's Children's Garden. It was built in 1935, one of several construction projects completed by the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC). The CCC was a job creation program enacted by President Franklin Delano Roosevelt to help America recover from the Great Depression. The CCC existed roughly between 1933 and 1942. While not considered to be "military," per se, the program was administered by the Army. Notably, Fort Williams was home to two CCC companies- the 165th (an administration unit), and the 1131st (a construction unit).

In addition to the pool, the 1131st also installed the stone edging around the lily pad pond. It built the concrete bleachers at the parade ground, of which only one segment remains (where our high school graduations

are held, weather permitting). The CCC built a movie theater on base, tennis courts and a handball court (all 1938), and other projects- within Fort Williams and in the surrounding area.

The swimming pool at Fort Williams served not only enlisted soldiers and their families, but also offered hours for public use. One of my friends took swimming lessons there.

Like other features of Fort Williams that brought liability exposure, the unmanaged and unsupervised pool was buried in the 1970s. Tell-tale chunks of aqua-painted concrete were excavated during the site work at the Children's Garden in 2016.

The 1936 photo, shown above, of the brand new pool and the lily pad pond beyond comes to the Cape Elizabeth Historical Preservation Society from Millard Pippin, whose father was stationed at Fort Williams at the time.

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News from the superintendent

Happy summer to all of you! As the school year closes and I turn 50, I have been reflecting a great deal. I have come to realize that life/work is full of long days, long weeks and very short years. This school year has absolutely flown by.

As I reflect, I think about all of the interactions our amazing staff has had with our wonderful students and parents this school year. Every single one of those moments in time matter as we aim to provide our students with the very best education we can. This can only continue to be done with your incredible support of our schools.

Our students are the leaders of tomorrow and we need them to be prepared to tackle the challenges that lay ahead. How we educate them from Pre-K to graduation truly matters. With that in mind, I humbly ask you to support our 2023-2024 school budget. Yes our expenditures are up this year due to the following reasons:

- Increasing Maintenance & Repair Issues for Our Aging Schools
- Electricity & Fuel Costs have increased significantly
- Health Insurance rates are continuing to escalate (6% increase this year versus .035% last year)
- Required retirement contributions to the state are increasing
- The overall impact on supply/maintenance costs from inflation and supply

chain issues

- Meeting the labor market demands of recruiting and retaining high-quality personnel
- We negotiated three contracts last year and negotiated two more this spring. The tightening labor market, high inflation, and our collective interest in recruiting and retaining high quality staff has led to higher than typical increases to our labor costs. Personnel is around 83% of our budget.

However, I do want to remind the public that our expenditure increase last year ranked 13th in Cumberland County. Every year will be different and I am hopeful our expenditure increase will be less next year. That is certainly our aim.

There has been some conversation about class sizes in the community and I want to address those as well. The School Board did discuss class sizes during the budget workshops this winter and the topic was also discussed at the School Board/Town Council joint budget workshop on April 24.

Due to our analysis of student numbers and student needs, we reduced one core subject classroom teacher at CEMS in the current FY23 budget and we reduced an additional CEMS core subject classroom teacher in the recently School Board approved FY24 budget. We believe maintaining our projected class sizes for the 2023-2024 is important academically and socially/emotionally for our students as we continue to address any individual learning needs based upon the impact of the Covid years.

Obviously, having a smaller number of students in each classroom allows each teacher to provide more attention to each learner and differentiate more effectively. The actual sq. foot size of our classrooms, is an additional challenge if we reach the high range of the School Board class size parameters. We will continue to monitor class sizes going forward and make adjustments to the number of classroom teachers as we did for this current year and for next.

I would like to update you on the work of the School Building Advisory Committee (SBAC). In January 2023 the

Maureen O'Meara clarified that a new lease has been signed, notarized, and the town's rights and responsibilities are laid out," and "as far as the town is concerned, ready to proceed."

Chair Sahrbeck asked Reid for clarification of the perimeter fence. The amended location is 15 feet away from the solar array, which is compliant with the national electrical code. Reid also mentioned there will be no signage on the site minus a small placard with contact information.

The board motioned for site plan amendments to install solar array be sent to Town Council for review at which time a public hearing will be held. This motion passed unanimously with no discussion from the board.

LD 2003 Zoning Ordinance Amendments

The Town Council has referred to the Planning Board for review and recommendation LD 2003 Amendments, Sec. 19-10-3, Amendments Public Hearing.

O'Meara shared with the board amendments proposed by town attorney Mary Costigan on certain language changes. After discussion by the board, they decided to leave the language as it stands for clarity and "consistency" throughout the document.

LD 2003 zoning ordinance is set to take effect on July 1, 2023, and applies to existing accessory, secondary and garage structures on a property. The ordinance committee has been working on these amendments since July 2022 in order to prepare the town and its citizens.

Tim Thompson of 6 Pine Ridge Road, Vice Chair of Housing Diversity Committee, shared that the timeline seems rushed as there needs to be time for public comment after the amendments leave the Planning Board and go back to the Town Council for consideration. He also asked the board why the maximum size for an ADU is 1,800 square feet when an ADU expert said that a size of 600-800 square feet is typical.

Tim Reiniger of 40 Belfield Road shared concerns that a property owner may tear down their existing home in order to construct a 4-unit building in its

place, and that the town center will be most affected by LD 2003.

Chair Sahrbeck responded to concerns addressed by Reiniger and Thompson by saying "in regards to size, we discussed that every structure will have required setbacks and restrictions on building lots and there will be adequate protection in regards to size of the unit."

Sahrbeck and O'Meara addressed concerns that a property could be purchased for the intent to level existing structures and build a 4-unit building in its place. O'Meara said that "anyone can buy a single family home right now and tear it down. They have the same setbacks, same height requirements," and that "it's a property rights decision."

O'Meara also shared that the current Cape Elizabeth ordinance restricts property owners to building an ADU "no more than 25% of the size of the primary structure and that it can't be larger than 600 square feet." She shared that "LD 2003 is much different" and allows "a little bit more space" for property owners to build ADUs for family members, for example.

The board decided to recommend to the Town Council to review a potential conflict between calculation of number of parking units and dwelling units stating, "this may need more policy consideration."

Project Submission Ordinance Amendments

The Planning Board discussed a referral from the Town Council to assemble a package of amendments that update submission requirements and deadlines including but not limited to adjusting deadlines in line with new town hall office hours (effective July 1, 2023) and formalizing digital material submissions.

Currently, submissions are due 18 days prior to a Planning Board meeting with most deadlines falling on a Friday. Starting July 1, 2023, the town hall will not be operating on Fridays and will affect deadlines.

Al Palmer motioned that the board considers the referral of project submission amendments of which Dan Bodenski seconded. The board agreed to put this issue on the table to complete for the June workshop meeting.



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

Spring Fix- Up Scams

Spring has sprung and with warmer weather comes home repairs. Unfortunately, shady contractors are out there looking homeowners in the market for spring repairs. Contractor fraud and home improvement scams can cost homeowners thousands of dollars and leave them with shoddy workmanship, unfinished projects, or even damage to their homes.

Scammers often target older adults, but anyone can fall victim to these scams. Here are three things to know to stay safe from a home improvement rip off.

First, make sure to shop around. Don't settle for the first contractor you encounter. Get multiple estimates and ask for references before hiring anyone.

Next, never pay the full cost upfront. Reputable contractors typically require a deposit, but not the full amount prior to the job starting.

Lastly, resist responding to a solicitation

at your door, on your phone or online. Be proactive in your search for a reputable contractor.

Where to Turn After the Scam

If there is one thing everyone should understand, it's that "scammers" are career criminals skilled at the art of manipulation and no one is immune. These crooks target people of any age; in fact, 41% of those who reported a fraud loss to the Federal Trade Commission last year were under the age of 30. So, what can a person do if they experience fraud?

One resource is the AARP Fraud Watch Network Helpline. Every weekday, trained AARP volunteer fraud fighters are helping victims and their families understand what happened, report the crime and start to put their lives back together. If you or someone you know has been the victim of fraud, call the AARP Fraud Watch Network Helpline at 1-877-908-3360 for support. And make sure to file a report with local police; you will have this as evidence in the event restitution becomes possible down the line.

Update from SBAC Committee

The Cape Elizabeth School Building Advisory Committee (SBAC), established in March 2023, is making significant strides toward addressing the town's school building needs.

The SBAC was formed with a commitment to develop a practical and cost-conscious plan to address the needs of the town's schools, with a goal for a revised referendum by November 2024. A key component of this new approach involves hiring an Owner's Representative. This professional team will provide much-needed technical guidance and expertise; assistance with developing construction options; cost and risk management; and general support for the committee's responsibilities. After a rigorous evaluation, the committee made a recommendation for selection. On May 30, the Town Council and School Board unanimously voted to approve the recommendation and begin contract negotiations with the selected firm.

In addition, the SBAC is finalizing plans to send a survey to each household in Cape Elizabeth in July. This survey seeks to understand how different groups in town feel about the school project and why the referendum in

November did not pass. The SBAC is seeking high participation to ensure future plans reflect the needs and concerns of the community. After the survey results are analyzed, the SBAC will communicate these findings in a public forum.

The committee spent its initial weeks learning about the history and needs of the school buildings and creating a plan to move forward with an informed, inclusive approach. In a joint statement, committee co-chairs Town Councilor Penny Jordan and School Board Member Cindy Voltz said, "The Owner's Representative and the town-wide survey are vital tools for this committee's work. We're committed to meeting the needs of our students and educators, engaging with our community and being responsible stewards of taxpayer dollars."

Together with the Owner's Representative, the SBAC will begin an evaluation of previous work and move toward the development of options to address the needs of the school buildings, which will lead to a recommenda-







Am I missing something?


I've been following the story of our unhoused being removed over and over again from different sites.

School Board and Town Council agreed to a joint effort to develop solutions for Cape Elizabeth's aging school buildings by creating the School Building Advisory Committee (SBAC).

The scope includes all three schools, and it was agreed an Owner's Representative would be hired to assist the committee on their charge. The role of the Owner's Representative is to represent the Owner's interests and provide program management for the development and completion of a high quality, timely, cost-effective project, including design and construction, equipment and materials, through final completion.

The selection process for Owner's Representative was initiated by SBAC in February 2023 seeking firms through request for qualifications. Five firms responded. The SBAC then vetted and ranked the submissions and identified three candidates to ask to develop proposals. Just prior to the deadline one candidate withdrew.

Candidates were asked to prepare presentations as part of their interview. In addition, questions that arose from the review of their proposals were sent to the candidates to be included in their presentations. On May 25, the SBAC held interviews and selected CBRE/HEERY as the finalist for School Board and Town Council consideration on May 30.

CBRE/HEERY was selected for the following reasons:

- Extensive experience with K-12 school projects
- Excellent RFQ & RFP packets
- Depth of knowledge and expertise as articulated through the interview process
- Outstanding reference checks
- Willingness to negotiate pricing

Additionally SBAC will soon launch a communitywide survey regarding the past November school referendum and how to move forward with a successful plan.

The purpose of the survey is to gain a better understanding of the hopes, concerns, motivations and priorities of Cape Elizabeth citizens regarding our schools and why the school bond proposal was supported or rejected in 2022.

The insights gathered from the survey will enable the SBAC committee to make informed decisions on how to proceed. The committee's primary objective is to understand why the bond referendum failed and to use that information to craft future plans that will generate majority support from citizens while meeting the needs of students, educators, families and the community.

The survey will help the committee to gain a deep understanding of the citizens' sentiments and make informed decisions that align with the interests of the community.

To that end, the Survey Subcommittee of SBAC reviewed survey proposals submitted by six firms. Three firms were selected to be interviewed. From that interview process and reference checks, Portland Research Group (PRG) was selected as the finalist and endorsed by SBAC as the selection for the following reasons:

- An impressive interview that was both informative and congenial
- A survey methodology that will reach every household/citizen in Cape Elizabeth with both electronic and paper survey options
- Outstanding reference checks that highlighted their excellent responsiveness, collaboration, analysis, and communication skills
- Successful survey experience in Maine and knowledge of Cape Elizabeth
- Competitive pricing

Finally, I want to share a wonderful CEHS Senior Transition Project completed by Finn Bridge at the Pond Cove Playground. Over a two-week period, Finn created new benches and a sandbox for three different areas of the playground. We are delighted to see kids actively using all of it.

Thank you to the PC Playground Committee for providing funding and thanks to 4th grade teacher Tara Bucci for taking the opportunity to connect her former student Finn with her current students in a math exercise involving the sandbox dimensions. The real-life learning is so beneficial and they were notably and deservedly proud of themselves.

Most of all, thanks to Finn for using his construction, problem-solving and communication skills to get all of this completed and to secure a \$100 lumber donation from Home Depot and sand donation from Tammaro Landscaping, an initiative he undertook all on his own.

In closing, I again want to thank all of you for your support of our students and staff and the 23-24 school budget. Please remember to vote. These are challenging times for many of us, but I see a hopeful future for our students, staff and for our community. I wish you all a wonderful summer!

At the end of their senior year, students at Cape Elizabeth High School participate in an experience known as the Senior Transition Project. Students propose projects to gain hands-on experience, which must be approved by faculty. Afterwards, the students return to CEHS and give presentations about their experience.

STP is a time for making new discoveries and taking responsible risks. Projects that are merely longer extensions of familiar activities are not approved. Students are told to look for opportunities they might never have had before or again.

On Ander Erickson:

"It is a pleasure to have Ander joining me here at the state house. He's punctual, attentive and always game for whatever the day throws our way. I believe he is getting an unvarnished view of legislative life - good and bad. I am happy to say that he jumped right into drafting testimony for me on a bill which I am cosponsoring and he will be attending a summit on the economy and climate tomorrow on my behalf."

"He is quite a special young man. I don't know where to start. He's here starting as early as 8:30 a.m. for chairs and doesn't leave until I wrap up, anywhere from 4 p.m. to tonight at 6:30 p.m. He's literally become an honorary member of the democratic education committee caucus as my stand in while I am working in AFA dem caucus keeping me apprised of caucus conversation, committee debate and votes. He brought them whoopie pies today! He wrote and presented testimony on my behalf on a housing bill and attended a climate/economy summit later that day to report back to me what he learned. He's in the process of writing floor remarks for me on a joint resolution commemorating World Refugee Day. He has been so helpful as I juggle serving on two committees. I literally don't know what I'm going to do when he's not here."

He is looking at: Labor and Wage laws as they relate to farm workers and how farm workers do not fall under the definition of an employee so do not qualify for overtime pay, he is looking at other states and the bill before Maine legislature this session; I also suggested he understand the Farm Bill land what's in it and how it impacts farms, and then PFAS of course and what Maine has done re: legislation as it relates to agriculture."

CAPE ELIZABETH RESIDENTS FACE AN UNCERTAIN FINANCIAL FUTURE

One need not be an economist to understand that we are teetering on the edge of a recession while dealing with a rampant rise in the cost of electricity, food, gasoline, and home heating costs. Amidst this economy, Cape residents face an impending "perfect storm" of unprecedented tax hikes that will affect every resident's household budget.

Our community is composed of families with a range of incomes, with roughly 30% of our neighbors cost-burdened, including single parents, senior residents on fixed incomes, and young families who aspire for the Cape quality of life. But, living in Cape, one thing stands out:

Cape Elizabeth is almost entirely funded by residential home property taxes, and a "triad" of tax increases now threatens to radically increase your cost of staying in Cape. By how much? No one knows.

PROPERTY TAX REVALUATION

Cape is in the midst of a complete townwide property revaluation, the results of which one can only speculate. What is certain? School districts receive a share of state-based funding based on a formula determined largely by a district's student enrollment and overall property values. Fewer students and higher property values equal less state support, meaning more of the burden will fall on the residential homeowner. The last comprehensive "door-to-door" inspection was performed in 2003 and the most recent "statistical update" was completed in 2011. But, what will your property tax bill be next year? **No one knows.**

SCHOOL BUILDINGS BOND PROPOSAL

The massive school bond initiative of \$116 million was overwhelmingly rejected this past November. But, a newly formed School Building Advisory Committee is now reconsidering options from renovation to new construction. What will their proposal look like? What will our Town Council do with the Committee's recommendation? How much will this add to our community's cost burden? Once again, **no one knows.**

2023-2024 SCHOOL BUDGET

Our school budget is about 2/3rd of your total tax bill. Long-term trends show Cape's school enrollment continuing to decline while budgets increase at a pace that significantly exceeds inflation. Cape voters have historically supported our school budget, to a point where our small class sizes are virtually unmatched in Maine. Don't let anyone tell you that Capers don't support our schools. But at some point the math simply doesn't work. At a cost of over \$20,000 per student, when does an ever-increasing school budget become unsustainable? This year's proposed budget represents an increase of roughly \$3 million (9%) – adding about \$2,000 more per student.

VOTE ON JUNE 13th. We take no position on the school budget, but believe good governance starts with a holistic look at all costs – known or unknown. The ballot asks two questions: (1) Do you approve the school budget and (2) Do you find the school budget to be too high, acceptable, or too low?

What is the Cape Neighbors Alliance?

We are a group of citizens who believe that good governance happens when our community is heard, our government's processes are transparent, and personal agendas are set aside. We intend to stand with our neighbors and our community to ensure this vision becomes reality.

If you thought you heard hooting owls in the middle of the day May 18 and 19 somewhere near Pond Cove School, you’re right! Well, not real owls. It was Pond Cove students joining book creators Christopher and Anika Aldamuy Denise in a read-along of Chris’s NYT bestselling “Knight Owl” (Little Brown, 2022).

Thanks to a generous grant from CEEF and PCPA funding, students had two days of creative bliss with the talented duo. Besides multiple books they’ve created collab-

oratively, Anika and Chris have successful careers independent of each other.

Anika is best known for her award-winning picture book biographies celebrating strong Puerto Rican women, while Chris has illustrated over twenty books. “Knight Owl” is his debut as a writer, and it won a Caldecott Honor in January. They encouraged students to pay attention to things that make them curious, to let mistakes happen (they’re often surprising) and always ask: “What if?”





June naturalist's corner

June 21, 10:57 a.m.: Summer Solstice. Happy longest day and shortest night of the year (at least in the Northern Hemisphere)! Fun fact: Pagans called the Midsummer moon the "Honey Moon" for the mead made from fermented honey that was part of wedding ceremonies performed at the summer solstice.

The official name for the skunk family is Mephitidae, which means "stink." Since it's

a sulfur-based chemical comprised of thiols (also found in garlic and onions), skunk spray is highly flammable! In order to fully banish the smell, you need to alter the chemical makeup of the thiols, which you can do with a mixture of baking soda and hydrogen peroxide. Humans can smell skunk spray up to a mile away. Porcupines give birth to one baby. Baby porcupines are called porcupettes. The porcupette sports a full set of quills that are soft at birth, yet harden within an hour.



tion to present to the voters of Cape Elizabeth. The committee also plans to conduct public outreach and establish a timeline for the successful completion of the project. All SBAC recommendations require the endorsement of both the School Board and the Town Council. Additionally, a bond referendum is dependent on the majority support of Cape Elizabeth's citizens, currently targeted for November 2024.

The SBAC encourages all community members to engage in this process and stay informed. They are confident that their collaborative and thoughtful approach will guide Cape Elizabeth into a beneficial educational future for students, educators and the wider community.

The SBAC is a joint initiative by the School Board and the Town Council, formed in March 2023. Its mission is to create a strategic, cost-effective plan to address the school building needs of Cape Elizabeth following the rejection of a \$116 million school bond referendum in November 2022. The SBAC's work is focused on thorough assessment, comprehensive community outreach and the development of a plan that serves the needs of students, educators, families and the community.
